Year 5 -This half term, we have been looking at the artwork of Stephen Wiltshire and the children have been drawing their own pen and ink cityscapes.



This year the debate was on whether children under the age of 14 should have access to smart phones.



A great big thank you to all of our families for the generous donations to our Harvest appeal for local charities.



Reception

We have enjoyed exploring our classrooms and outdoor environment. We love our class book corners and hearing stories read by our teachers!

We have loved taking part in our daily 'drawing club' with our teachers and friends. We write letters in sand, flour or glitter and also write 'magic messages' to stick on people!



We love exploring our senses and particularly enjoyed scooping out the insides from pumpkins this term! We used words like 'sticky', 'orange' and 'wet' to describe what we could feel!

In maths we have made repeating patterns, sorted objects into different groups and have also started to practise counting and writing numbers.







In maths we have been looking at numbers within 10. Concentrating on knowing which numbers are greater and smaller than each other.

As part of our Science and Geography learning, we went on an Autumn walk to the Woodland area at Meadway. We enjoyed looking at the changing leaves and spotting other signs of Autumn.





We have been exploring our new outdoor area, and will be using it to extend our classroom learning during continuous provision.



In science we have been learning about parts of our bodies, as well as exploring our senses! We had an amazing science afternoon where we tasted and smelt so many different things.



In English we have been reading some amazing books! Our favourites have been 'The Tiger Who Came to Tea' and Monkey puzzle. Look at our amazing work on display. We have also been doing daily handwriting, to help us form all our letters correctly.




In PE this year we have enjoyed making the most of the sunshine and have been walking down to our Meadway field to take part in Golden Games with Year 2. We have been practising our throwing and catching skills using a variety of different equipment, including balls, bean bags and hoops.

In art, we have been looking at our bodies in action and created line drawings of different movements. We also studied our eyes and created detail sketches of them. Lastly, we looked at cubism and studied the work of Picasso. We then used what we learned to create our own portraits in the same style using oil pastels.


In English, we have been learning to write descriptions using expanded noun phrases. We enjoyed writing our own stories based on the book 'Bog Baby' and created our own mysterious creatures. We also read 'Couch Potato' which has linked nicely with our unit in Science about how to have a healthy lifestyle.

In Maths we have been learning to partition a two-digit number and use the symbols for more than and less than. We have started to learn how to add and subtract.






The Year 3 staff are so proud of each and every child for how well they have settled into life into Year 3. They have all worked so hard.

informative fact files on Ancient Egypt.








Science


We've had a great start to Year 4 this first half term. We've focused on the text *Fantastic Mr Fox* in English, worked with numbers up to 10,000 in Maths as well as studying the rise and fall of the Roman


Empire in our History lessons and so much more!

In Science we have been studying electricity. We explored the differences between mains and battery powered devices and had a go at developing our prediction skills whilst making our own circuits using cells and lightbulbs. We also made different types of switches and had a go at using motors with our own spinners!













In Art we have been looking at the different types of drawing techniques needed when drawing portraits. We studied the work of Frida Kahlo and her style of surrealist self-portraits. We used iPads to take a photo of ourselves and created our own in our sketchbooks!

During Roman Day, our Year 4 children were able to get involved in many creative History activities!

This included: working with Roman numerals in Maths, creating a fact file on Hadrian's Wall, designing and making a mosaic tile and taking part in a Roman feast and drama workshop!












Year 5 have been doing some wonderful cross curricular learning this half term about the ancient Maya civilisation. In **History**, we have been using sources of evidence to find out what daily life was like for the Maya people. In **English**, we used our text, Rain Player, as a stimulus for some wonderful writing. The book tells the story of a young boy who challenges the Rain God, Chac, to a game of Pok-a-Tok in order to bring about much needed rain for his people. We wrote adverts to persuade people to join Pik's team; diary entries imagining it was the night before the big match and then ended the book with a thrilling match report. We then spent a week researching and answering the question: What have the Maya done for us? Quite a lot it turns out- we have the Maya to thank for chocolate, team sports, one of the first calendars and the introduction of farming techniques still used today. We researched an area in groups and presented it to the class. We then used this information to write an essay to explain what some of the greatest achievements of the Maya were,

using cohesive devices to link together our paragraphs.

In **Art**, we have been developing our drawing and painting skills including using watercolours in our Cityscapes unit. We have explored perspective and studied the work of Stephen Wiltshire. This has inspired our own drawings of cityscapes using ink pens.

In **Religion and Worldviews**, we have been looking at charities. We have looked at the parable of The Good Samaritan and discussed the message of 'Love thy neighbour'. We looked at the Black Lives Matter protest and the news story about Patrick Hutchinson. We have tried to empathise with those facing poverty on the streets of Kolkata by making paper bags. We have looked at a range of charities, including Oxfam and Islamic Relief.

The children have really enjoyed Anthony Horowitz's exciting story about the teenage spy, Alex Rider. Inspired by the book, they have designed and persuasively sold their spy gadgets and written about the Portuguese Man o' War in the style of David Attenborough.



History

Our topic this half-term has been Ancient Greece, including the origins of democracy and the Olympics. We have spent time creating our own Greek theatre masks, inspired by Greek gods and goddesses.



Year 5 listened to and sang Nina Simone's classic protest song "I wish I knew how it would feel to be free' and Year 6 learned about the short but inspiring life of Bob Marley.
